Family Care of the Elderly families were historically to care for elderly impaired family members at home Prominent family-care researchers Ethel Shanas (1979b) and Elaine Brody (1981) refer to this belief as the "myth of abandonment" because there is little scientific evidence to support it, and, indeed, much evidence to the contrary
